- In 1870, the First Presbyterian Church on Eighth St. and D St. (now Broadway) started the first Chinese Mission in San Diego as part of their Sunday School program, which offered English language classes for male Chinese immigrants to learn English and Christian teachings two nights a week.¹ 在1870年,第一個開始中國傳教團是在聖地牙哥第八大街和D大街(現為百老 匯)的基督長老會,其中周日學校的一部分計劃是一周兩個晚上為中國的男性 移民提供英語課程,以學習英語和基督教教義。
- To the missionaries, Americanizing the Chinese here was a way of preparing them to bring the American culture and the Christian faith back to China.² 對傳教士而言,在這裡美化中國人是要他們準備將美國文化及基督教信仰帶回 中國的一種方式。
- The Chinese were more than willing to risk becoming Christianized in order to learn English, to help them get jobs and to get around.³

- In the beginning there were only 7 students at the Presbyterian Mission.
 As the number of students grew, they hired more teachers.

- One of their new English teachers happened to be George W. Marston, a very wealthy member of the First Congregational Church and the founder of the Marston Department

Store in San Diego.

- Although Ah Quin had studied English as a child at the American Missionary School in Canton, he continued refining his English skills at both the American Baptist and First Presbyterian Chinese Missions in San Diego.⁵

A local Chinese man named Hong Lee convinced Dr. William C. Pond, the Superintendent of Chinese Work for The American Missionary Association in San Francisco, to start a Chinese Mission School in San Diego.

- William Pond rented a small house at 631 First Ave. from George Marston to start his Chinese Mission School. It offered free English classes six evenings a week. Before long, Chinese immigrants of all ages were going there for English classes after work.¹¹



In 1889 Pond purchased a house and relocated the school to 639 Thirteenth Street¹³ where there were as many as 50 students per class studying English and religion free of charge.¹⁴ In 1900 he moved the Chinese Mission School to 663 First Avenue on the edge of Chinatown to accommodate the growing number of students.¹⁵ 1889年,龐德購買了一所房屋,並將學校搬遷至第十 三街639號,在那裡每班多達50名學生免費學習英語 和宗教。1900年,他將中國教會學校搬到了唐人街邊 緣的第一大街663號,以容納越來越多的學生.

It was a small one-story building with a long 18-room dormitory building behind it, which also happened to be owned by George Marston. - By 1907, all the other missions had closed and the Chinese Mission School absorbed all their members..¹⁷ 在1907年時,中國宣教學校吸收了所有其他關閉宣 教機構的會員.

In 1925, as the congregation grew, the members felt they really needed a Chinese pastor. Rev. Ching Chong Hung was born in China and came to San Diego from Hawaii as a part-time pastor and student at San Diego State College. He was bilingual and delivered sermons in both English and Cantonese.

In July of 1927, the Mission School was forced to move all of its church services and classes to the CCBA building in Chinatown.

- The Mission School had become dilapidated. So the school turned to the Chinese Consolidated Benevolent Association as a temporary home while the old building was being torn down and a new Mission was being built. - The new Mission-style building and dormitory was completed in November 1927.²⁰ 新的宣教建築和宿舍於1927年11月完工。
- The name was changed from Mission School to Chinese Mission. The Chinese name translated to San Diego Chinese Congregational Church.²¹ 宣教學校後來改為中國宣教。中文名稱翻譯為聖地亞哥中國公理會。

After C.C. Hung left in 1928, the Chinese Mission would go through four ministers and four long years without a Chinese language program. C.C. Hung於1928年離開之後,中國宣教經歷四位牧師 在沒有中文課程的情況下渡過四年的漫長歲月。

In 1930, the the immigration laws were revised to allow some wives of Chinese citizens to come to the United States.²² 1930年,移民法進行了修訂,允許一些中國公民的妻子來美國。

- By 1933 the city's Chinese population was estimated to be 400, and most of them turned to the Chinese Mission for some of its functions.




- Prior to joining the Mission School, Rev. Robert Lee was the Secretary of the YMCA in Shanghai.

When the Wongs joined the church, they lived in the mission dormitory. The Congregational Conference of Southern California contributed \$360/year towards his salary and CCBA paid him \$500/year for teaching Chinese School. He also taught at the adult education extension at the San Diego Unified School District and was the church janitor.

- When Rev. Kei Tin Wong and his wife, Edith, came to the Congregational Chinese Mission with their experience teaching Chinese in Tuscon and San Francisco, they were confident they could start a Chinese school at the Mission. Kei Tin王牧師和他的妻子伊迪絲帶著在土桑市和舊金山教中 文的經驗來到中國公會時,他們有信心可以在宣教學校開設 一所中文學校。

In March 1937, Rev. Wong started the first Chinese language school in San Diego with 20 students, which pleased the growing number of Chinese parents who were concerned about their American-born children losing their grasp on the Chinese language and culture.²⁴

- Because it was tuition-free, there was no excuse for parents not to send their children to Chinese School.

On December 13th, 1943, President Franklin Roosevelt signed a law repealing the Chinese Exclusion Act, allowing an immigration quota of 105 Chinese a year. It also granted immigrants naturalization rights for the first time.

■By the 1950s, the size of the congregation was flourishing thanks to the War Brides Act of 1945. Besides church services in English and Chinese and Sunday School classes for children, the Chinese Community Church sponsored a Ladies' Guild, Men's Club, Teenagers Club, picnics, youth outings, a Vacation Bible School during the summers and a Christmas night service for the whole family.³⁰






 Dr. Irene Cheng was born in Hong Kong in 1904 to Eurasian tycoon Sir Robert Ho Tung and his wife, Lady Clara Ho Tung.

■ She received her B.A. in Hong Kong in 1925, her M.A. from Columbia in 1929, and her Ph.D. from London University in 1936.⁴⁴

Cheng became a professor at Lingnan University in Guangzhou and a staff member of the Ministry of Education in Nanjing before returning to Hong Kong where she became the first senior education officer in 1948. She was appointed an Officer of the Order of the British Empire (O.B.E.) by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 1961.⁴⁵

 She spent many years as a lecturer on Chinese cultural life at the University of California, San Diego, and in community colleges and elementary and secondary schools, and was a speaker for many service clubs in San Diego prior to founding Chung Hwa School of San Diego, Inc. 在她創立聖地亞哥中華學校之前,她曾經是加州大學聖地亞哥分校、社區學院及中



<u>Dr. Cheng set up the school to cultivate the child's complete personality, by teaching Chinese</u> <u>language and culture: 1970 – 1993</u> <u>Dr. Cheng 成立學校,通過教授中國語文及文化來培養小朋友的人格: 1970年至1993年</u>

The curriculum included Conversation, Calligraphy, Reading, History, Geography, Music, Art and Drama. There were 7 different class levels (3 in Mandarin, 3 in Cantonese and 1 in Oral Mandarin for adults). Students only met on Tuesdays 4:00 p.m.-6:00 p.m. and Saturdays 9:00 a.m.-12:30 pm, while adults met on Saturdays. The \$45 tuition per 3-month terms fell short of the overall costs, so Dr. Cheng had to seek the support of family and friends in Hong Kong.⁴⁶ 課程包括會話、書法、閱讀、歷史、地理、音樂、藝術及戲劇。班別共有7個不同的等級(3班中文、3班廣東及1班中文會話)。學生只在禮拜二下午4點到6點及禮拜六早上9點到中午12點半上課。成人在禮拜六上課。因為每3個月45元的學費低於總支出,所以Dr. Cheng要請香港的家人及朋友支持。⁴⁶

Ms Wong is very knowledgeable of the San Diego Chinese community. Currently she also serves as Executive Director of the Chinese Social Services Center. She resides in San Diego with husband, Frank and daughter Tasha. She looks forward towards meeting the parents and friends of the Chung Hwa School during Chinese New Years. Or phone calls to the School during school hours can be made to set up visits or just to chat. Ms Wong says everyones ideas and comments on the teaching program and school improvements are sought.

- The school also provided information on Chinese culture for stage productions for the Miss Chinatown Pageant during the Chinese Lunar New Year festivities.

- For many years, the Chung Hwa Chinese School of San Diego was the premier Chinese school in San Diego and changed the lives of many American-born Chinese children.

Between 1979 and 1988 several other Chinese schools opened from North County to South Bay to meet the growing needs of immigrating Chinese families. 1979年至1988年之間,從北縣到南灣的其他幾 所中文學校開張,以滿足中國移民家庭日益增 長的需求。

In 1993, Dr. Irene Cheng decided to close Chung Hwa School of San Diego because of diminishing funding. 1993年,由於的經費減少,Irene Cheng博士決定 關閉聖地亞哥的中華學校。"

Sally Wong, the school principal, would reopen the school later that year as the Chinese School of San Diego with her personal funding. 該校校長Sally Wong於同年稍晚時以她的私人 資金重新開設聖地亞哥中文學校。

From 1993 - 2008, the Chinese School of San Diego grew by leaps and bounds. 由1993年到2008年,聖地亞哥中文學校迅速發展。

Sally's vision was to make the school's Chinese Language and Culture Program available to students of all ethnicities, and to make the Chinese School of San Diego the only fully-accredited Chinese language program in the county. The Chinese School of San Diego was registered with the San Diego Unified School District (SDUSD) and the Southern California Chinese Council of Schools (SCCS), and it would become the only Chinese School to receive accreditation with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).

Between 1994 and 2008, CSSD moved several times, from the Chinese Community Church to the Coleman College campus, back to the Chinese Community Church and to two different locations on Aero Drive, constantly looking for more space to expand. In 2008, Sally would finally move the Chinese School of San Diego to its current custom-built campus on Ruffin Road and launch their Chinese Bi-lingual Preschool. Between 1994 and 2008, enrollment increased by 265%, from 60 to 160 students.⁵²

從1994年到2008年,CSSD幾次搬遷,從華人社區教堂到Coleman學院,再回到華人社區教堂,再到Aero Drive上的兩個不同地點,不斷尋找更多的擴展空間。2008年,最後決定性地Sally將聖地亞哥中文學校遷移到 了目前在Ruffin Road上自建的校園,並創辦了中英幼兒園雙語學前班。從1994年到2008年,入學人數從60名 增加到160名,增長了265%。



At one time, the Chung Wah School and the Chung Hwa School of San Diego were the only Chinese Schools in San Diego, but today there are more than 20 independent Mandarin/Chinese culture schools throughout San Diego County, North County and South Bay, and that number is still growing.

There are also many Mandarin preschool and K-Age 10 and 12 programs, after school Mandarin Programs and Mandarin plus multi-lingual (English/Spanish/French/Hindi) language programs in San Diego.







The schools include the half-dozen well established independent Chinese language/culture schools which offer preschool or kindergarten to fully accredited high school programs; schools with multiple locations; preschool only, elementary school only, afterschool and weekend only, Mandarin instruction programs. There are also an increasing number of Mandarin/Multi-language instruction schools (i.e., Mandarin/English,

Mandarin/Spanish, etc.). 學校當中有半數獨立並有完善的中 文/文化學校為學前班或幼兒園提 供完全認可的高中課程; 學校有多 項定點; 有只是學前班, 有的是小 學, 有的只是課後及周末的中文課 程。中文/多國語言教學學校(即 中文/英語, 中文/西班牙語等)也 越來越多。

Among the growing number of Chinese language schools in San Diego, Chinese School of San Diego is the only one that offers both Mandarin and Cantonese instruction. 在聖地亞哥越來越多的中文學校中,聖地亞哥中文學校是唯一 同時提供中文和廣東話教學的學校。

Chinese School of San Diego continues to lead the way with its over 100 years of Chinese School history going back to 1885. 由1885年至今,超過100年歷史的 聖地亞哥中文學校繼續 帶領傳承中國語文及文化。
